

RASED for Parliamentary Monitoring Program RASED's Press Release on the Parliamentary Structure in its Third Ordinary Session December 29, 2015

- Al-Ittihad Al-Watani (The National Union) bloc has the highest representation of women, and Watan (Homeland) does not have any female members.**
- Al-Mubadara (The Initiative) bloc has the highest number of committee presidents, with female Parliament members serving as presidents of three committees.**
- Al-Islah (The Reform) and Al-Nahdah (The Renaissance) blocs are the most represented in the standing committees.**

RASED for Monitoring stated that the elected councils noted the structure of the Parliament in its third ordinary session has formed 7 parliamentary blocs instead of 8 in the second ordinary session.

In a detailed report about the structure of the Parliament in its third ordinary session, RASED added that the permanent office has been formed in the third ordinary session of 5 blocs, where the «Watan» (Homeland) parliamentary bloc has won the Parliament presidency for the third time through PM Atef Tarawneh. «Al-Wasat Al-Islami» (The Muslim Center) bloc has won the first president's deputy seat through PM Mustafa Amawi. As for «Al-Mubadara» (The Initiative) parliamentary bloc, it won the second president's deputy seat through PM Khamees Ateyyeh. «Al-Ittihad Al-Watani» (The National Union) bloc earned the president's first assistant seat through PM Ahmad al-

Humaisat, and «Al-Nahdah» (The Renaissance) bloc gained the seat of the president's assistant through PM Faten Khulaifat.

The report has showed that «Al-Nahdah» (The Renaissance) and «Al-Islah» (The Reform) parliamentary blocs have succeeded in getting the highest number of parliament members with 21 members each, which represents 14.1% of the total members. «Al-Ittihad Al-Watani» (The National Union) bloc comes after with 18 members, which represents around 12% of the total members. Both «Al-Wasat Al-Islami» (The Muslim Center) and «Watan» (Homeland) blocs come after with 17 members each and the percentage of 11.4%. At the end comes «Al-Wifaq» (The Agreement) and «Al-Mubadara» (The Initiative) parliamentary blocs with 15 members each and a percentage of 10% of the total Parliament members.

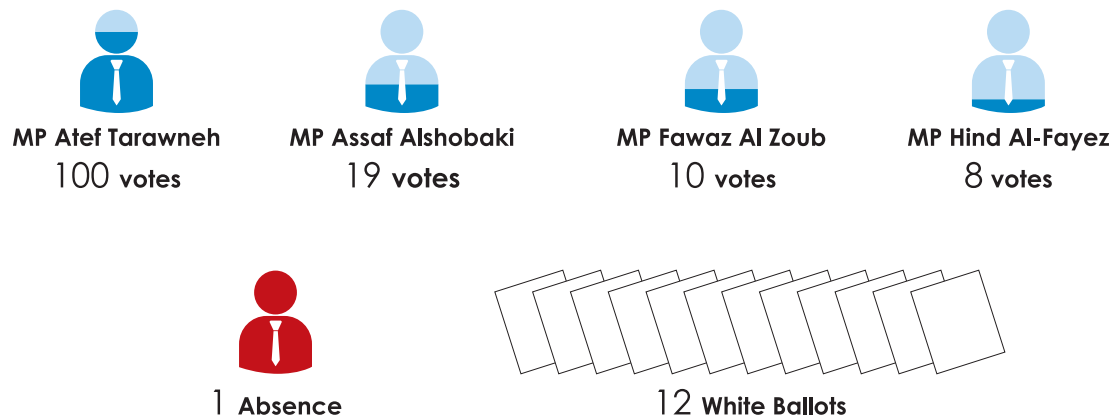
Regarding the distribution of the parliamentary bloc members on the standing committees, all parliamentary blocs have participated in the structure of the standing committees. «Al-Mubadara» (The Initiative) parliamentary bloc has dominated the committees' presidencies through chairing 4 committees, while «Al-Ittihad Al-Watani» (The National Union) and «Al-Wasat Al-Islami» (The Muslim Center) blocs had the lowest number of committees' presidents with one president each.

For the distribution of female Parliament members on the council's committees, PM Faten Khulaifat attained the seat of the Parliament president's second assistant. 16 female members have joined the standing committees with no female members in the other committees. Two of the 16 female members have joined one standing committee while the other 14 have joined two different committees.

Regarding the positions of these female members in the standing committees, female members have chaired 3 standing committees for the second time in the 17th Parliament, where PM Khulood Khatatbeh is the «National Guidance and Media» committee's president, PM Wafaa Bani Mustafa is the «Conduct» committee's president, and PM Reem Abu Dalbough is the president of the «Women and Family Affairs» committee. Female members have also got the seats of deputy presidents of 5 committees and the Record Keeper seat of 4 committees. Regarding the women presentation inside the parliamentary blocs, the «Al-Ittihad Al-Watani» (The National Union) bloc has the highest women's representation with 22% female members, «Al-Wifaq» (The Agreement) bloc comes in second with 13.3%, and «Watan» (Homeland) bloc has the lowest women's representation with no female members.

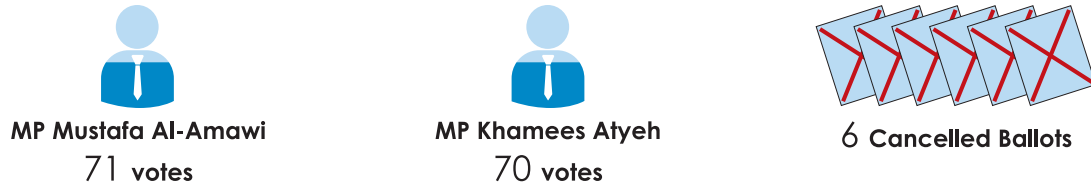
RASSED's analysis reveals that the second and third ordinary sessions have the highest number of female members in the position of the committees' president's deputy.

Election of the First Deputy Speaker for the 17th House - Third Ordinary Session



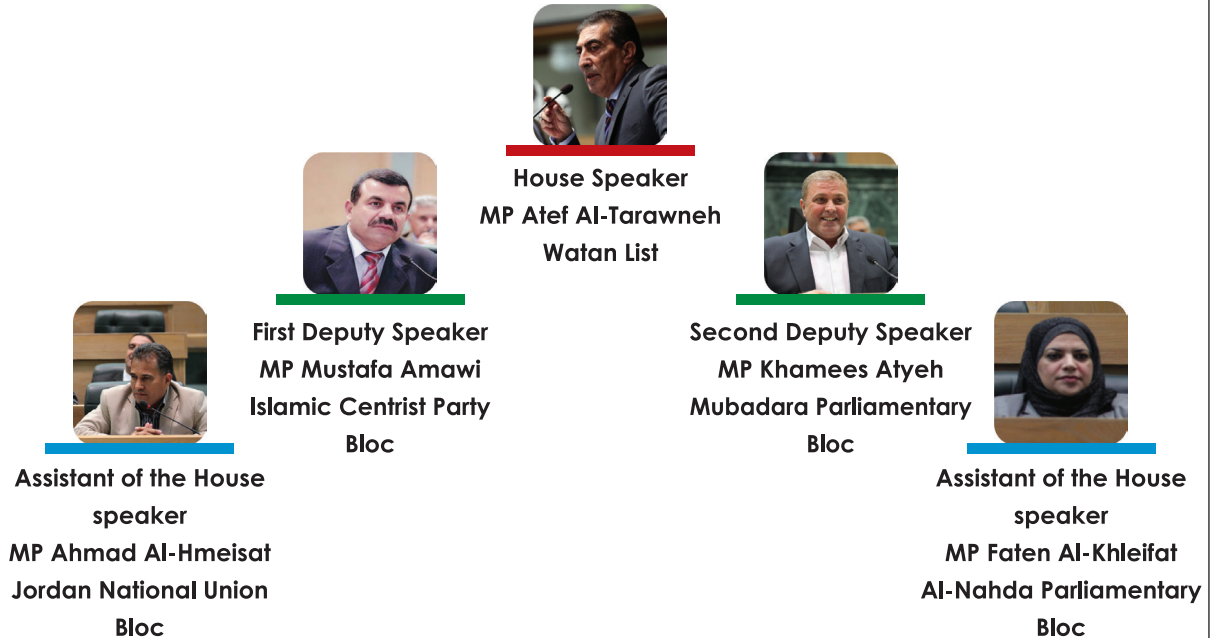
Graph (2): Second Round of the Elections of the First Deputy Speaker for the 17th House - Third Ordinary Session

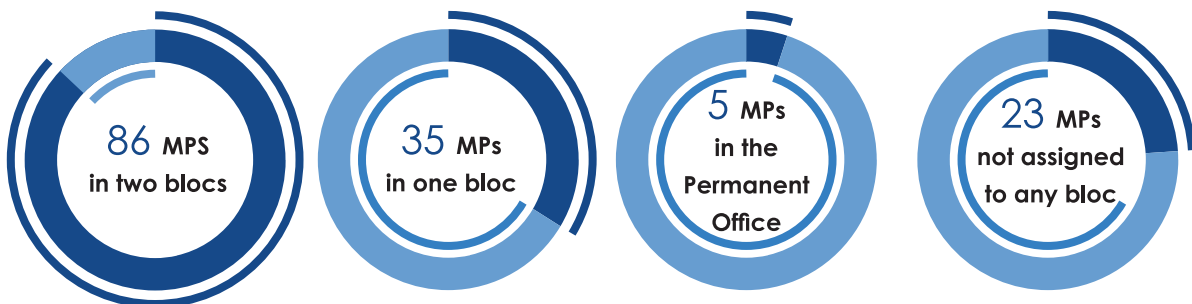
Allocation of Blocs in the Permanent Office - Third Ordinary Session

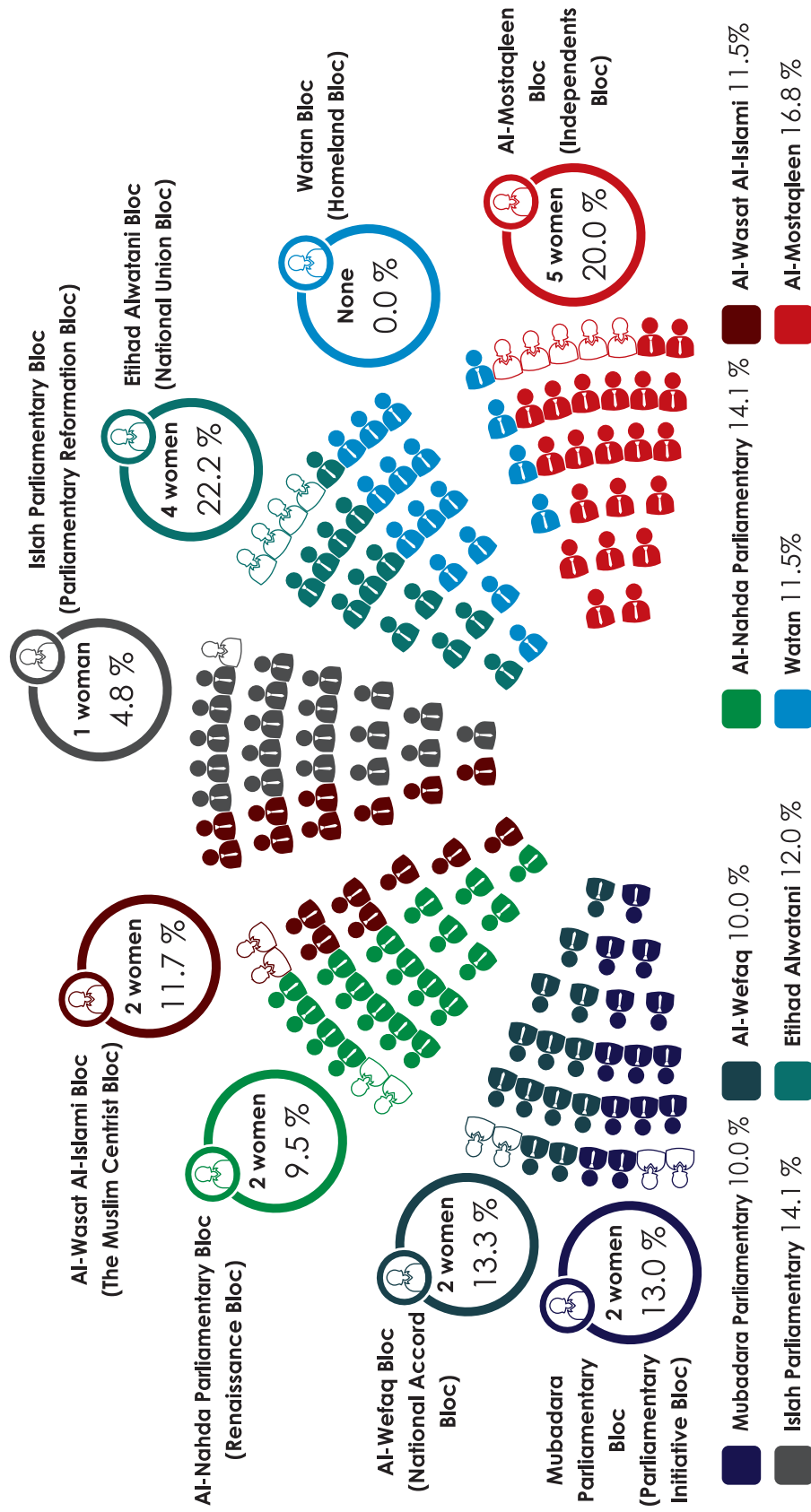

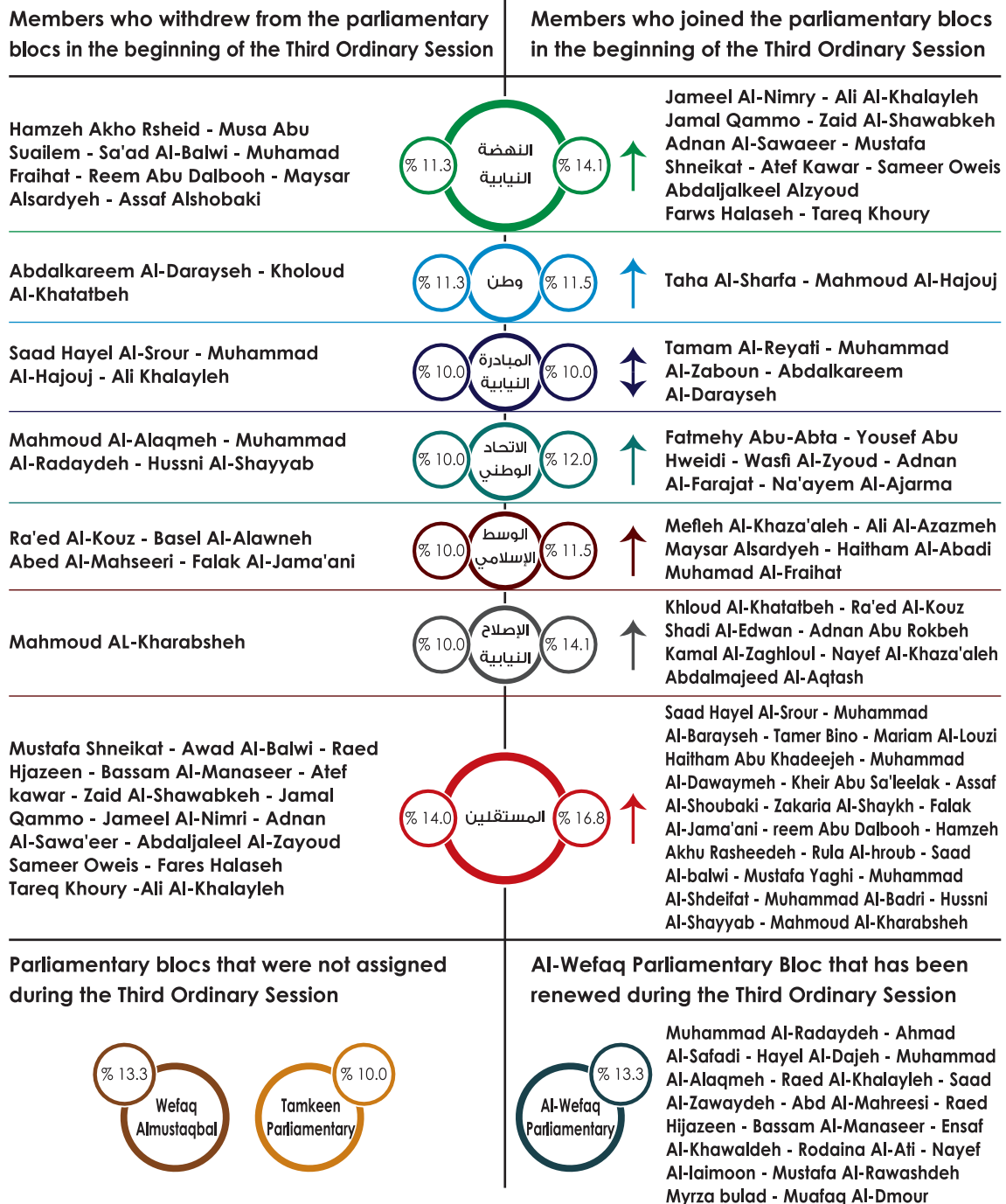

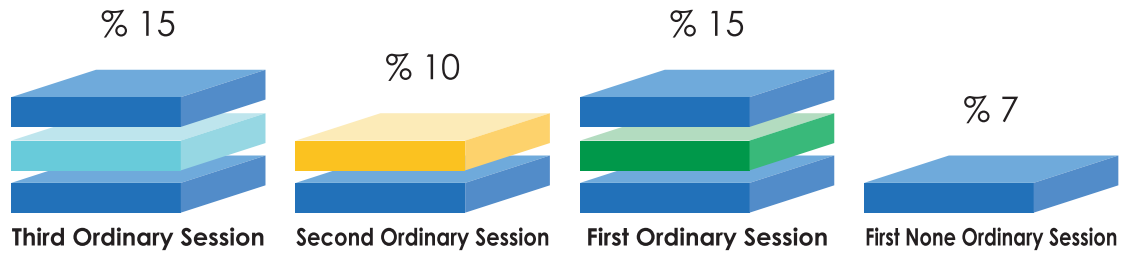
Graph (9): Comparison of the Allocation of Blocs in the Permanent Office During the Second and Third Ordinary Sessions

Graph (10): Comparison of the Movements of the Bloc's Members Between the Second and Third Ordinary Session

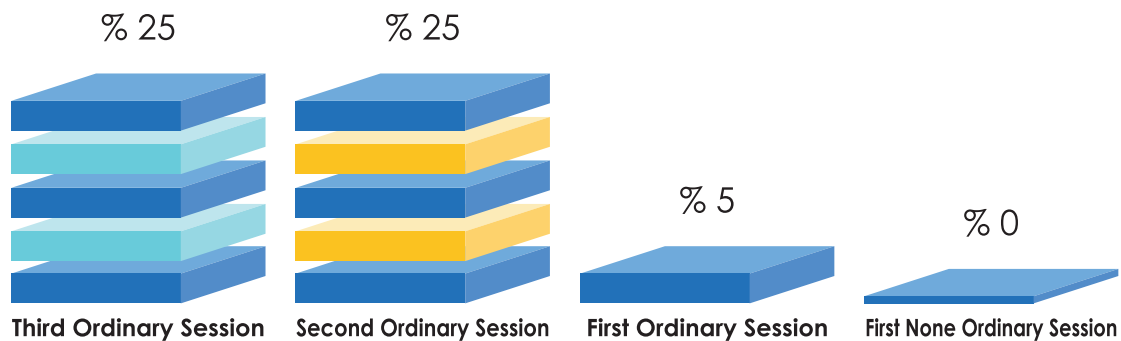
Comparison of the Percentage of Female Representation with the Position of Chairperson of the Standing Permanent Committee during the Sessions of the 17th House

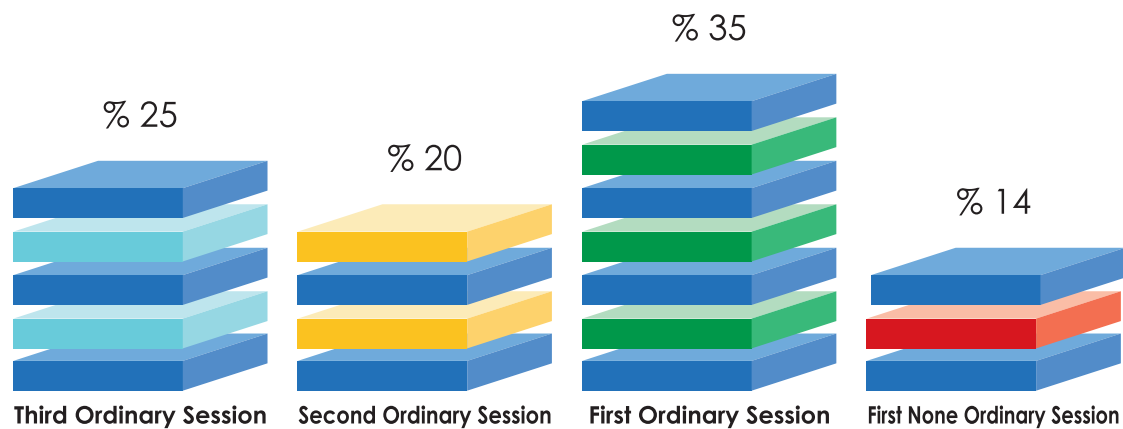
Comparison of the Percentage of Female Representation with the Position of Vice Chairperson of the Standing Permanent Committee during the Sessions of the 17th House
